

MURRAY PAPERS

- 3 Copy of a letter to Cardinal Franzoni. He observes that the Decree of the Council of Trent (session 24, Chapter 1) was not in force in certain Irish dioceses: Dublin, Meath, Kildare and Leighlin, Ossory, Ferns and the Wardenship of Galway- prior to 1 Jan. 1828; however, as it was regularly promulgated in those dioceses on 2 Dec. 1827 it accordingly came into force after thirty days within the entire island of Ireland. 9 Feb. 1852.

NON-IRISH BISHOPS

- 4 Dr Walsh, Halifax, to Murray. He enlisted 700 candidates for the Defence Association and sent on names and subscriptions. Comments on the downfall of Lord Palmerstoun and hopes Lord Russell will share his fate. 7 Jan. 1852.

NUNS

- 5 Nun in the Presentation Convent, Bagnalstown, to Murray, telling him how happy she is since she entered there. (His niece, Miss Corballis). New Year, 1852.
- 6 Sr M. le Frayne, Convent of the Holy Cross, Perth, to an unnamed priest. Describes in detail the conflict between Bishop Serra and the newly arrived Dr Brady, over the See of Perth. There is much dissension among the people who are taking sides. She gives news of their convent and the Sisters from Perth. 3 Jan. 1852.
- 7 Sr Vincent Whitty, Mercy Convent, Baggot Street, to Murray re the arrangements for confessions of children, community, and the young women in Refuge; also mass offerings and how chaplain is paid. 13 Jan. 1852.
- 8 Sr M. de Pazzi, Firhouse Carmel, to Murray. Fr Curtis, S.J. who is not suitable as a confessor is prepared to resign as confessor to the Carmelites and the nuns ask that a Dr Whelan, Deputy Superior be appointed as Confessor. 13 Jan. 1852.
- 9 Sr C. Mahony, Carmelite Convent, Loughrea, to Murray, asking for some of the charity fund left by the late Mr Moore. Her Community is destitute; the Friars are just as badly off; she trusts that Murray will help them. 1 Feb. 1852.
- 10 Sr M. A. Curran, Convent of the Conception, William Street, Dublin, to Murray. Gives news re a novice and two postulants and seeks Murray's advice. 21 Feb. 1852.

PRIESTS

- 11 Fr J. Curtis, S.J., to Murray enclosing No. 8 above and asking Murray to allow him to resign as confessor at Firhouse Carmel. 13 Jan. 1852.
- 12 J. Malone, Dundalk, to Murray. The translation of the new German Missal is being published by Messrs Richardson. As Murray promised to write commending the work in Ireland he is requested to do so now and oblige the writer of this letter. 3 Jan. 1852.
- 13 Fr Joseph Fitzgerald, P.P., Rahan, writing from Killina, Tullamore, to Murray. His sister is moving her boarding school from Upper Dorset Street to Upper Gloucester Street; now that she will be living in Marlborough Street parish, the Archbishop's parish, he hopes Murray will extend his patronage to her. 12 Jan. 1852.
- 14 Fr Thomas Meehan, Mount Pleasant, to Murray complaining about his situation, lack of promotion, etc. 19 Jan. 1852.
- 15 Fr Joseph Fitzgerald, P.P., Rahan, to Murray. He apologises for incorrectly addressing his former letter to Murray (cf. 13 above) which may have seemed disrespectful but was not intentionally so. 1 Feb. 1852.
- 16 Fr B. Sheridan, P.P., Kingstown, to Murray asking yet again that Fr Fitzpatrick be removed on account of his temper and disposition. 9 Feb. 1852.
- 17 Fr Redmond P.P., Arklow, thanking Murray for the £3 sent by Miss Doran; she will be glad to know that Arklow is progressing daily in industry, virtue and prosperity. 15 Feb. 1852.

- 18 Printed. Memorial of the Catholic members of the Council of the Tenant League to the Catholic Archbishops and Bishops of Ireland concerning the miserable condition of Ireland, due to emigration, rackrents, lack of industry, etc. 1852.
- 19 Patrick Lawlor J.P., 2 Beresford Place, Dublin, to Murray. 2 Feb. 1852.
- 20 Bill from Joseph Morgan, of Morgans, Hatters, Grafton Street, Dublin, for a silk hat supplied to Murray. Cost £1. 3 Feb. 1852.

- 21 Printed notice from the Secretaries of the Board of National Education to the Commissioners; this one to Murray. Notice of a meeting to consider whether a grant should be paid to the Munster Agricultural School and Model Farm; also to transact other business. 3 Feb. 1852.
- 22 Mrs M. E. Rorke to Murray, complaining that her second daughter, who entered the Loreto Order on condition that she remain in Ireland, has been sent to Cadiz. She asks Murray to intercede and have her daughter sent back to Ireland. 4 Feb. 1852.
- 23 William P. Matthews, Secretary to the Board of Charitable Bequests to Murray. Notice of a meeting of the Commissioners on 12 February; also information re a bequest and expenditure relating to the Roman Catholic Church in Baldoyle. 9 Feb. 1852.
- 24 Edward Jerningham, Pall Mall, London, to Murray, enclosing some accounts he received of the distress in the West of Ireland. 11 Feb. 1852.
- 25 Printed notice of the formation of a Committee named the Catholic Industrial Work Society for the purpose of setting up industrial schools in the West and other famine-stricken areas with a view to providing work and training. 21 Feb. 1852.
- 26 Second copy.
- 27 P. K. Jones (c/o Dr Parry Anglesea) to the Archbishop of Dublin seeking his assistance in placing his father-in-law, aged 108 and in great distress, in an asylum or home. 18 Feb. 1852.
